





Mid-Year Update, December 2024

School Garden - Fall Update

This fall, our class harvested garlic and herbs from our outdoor garden beds, used finished compost to fertilize the soil, and prepared our beds for winter. We spread wood chips generously donated by Linda and Mike Quintavalle. In the classroom, we maintained an indoor grow tower throughout the fall, have a worm composting station, and use the lettuce and herbs for salads.

Family & Consumer Science Partnership

Our Environmental class grows herbs and garlic in our gardens, and give them to the FACS class to use in their culinary courses. The FACS class also composts all of their vegetable food waste, which helps make good soil for our gardens. This is a great partnership! We have made salads, homemade dressing, pesto, and pasta sauce to sample what we've grown!

Hudson River Water Monitoring

Johnsburg Central School was given the exciting mission to explore and test the chemical balance of the beautiful Hudgor River. Twice! Students from Johnsburg collaborated with Minerva Long Lake and Schroen Lake to learn about the collaborated with mour streams. The data that we collected will be used by students all along the Hudson River basin, as we compare the quality of water in the river at our location versus places downstream.





Raising Brook Trout

Our 50-gallon cold-water tank is sponsored by the Trout in the Classroom program. We receive Brook Trout eggs from the Warren County Fish Hatchery in the fall, and release the trout into local streams in the spring. We started with 200 eggs and and of those 150 of those eggs hatched and we still have at least 100 fish going strong. Throughout the process of raising our class Brook Trout, we have had to do many water changes along with water tests. We learn about the trout life cycle and why they are an important indicator species for the Adirondack region.

Future projects

We have a lot of projects coming up in the near not so distant future. First up is the very complex process of production of maple syrup. By collecting the sap from Acer saccharum (the sugar maple tree) we are able to then run it through a system called a "Reverse Osmosis" which will remove some of the water and reduce the boiling time. The purchase of our R.O. system is made possible by the receipt of an Agricultural Literacy Grant from NY Ag. in the Classroom. We received this grant at the end of the last school year after our maple syrup placed 3rd in the state in their maple sugaring contest! It takes 40 gallons of sap to

make 1 gallon of syrup. We are excited to take part in the competition this year.

Another of our many very exciting projects coming up is to test snow depth and dive deep into snow science to be able to help accurately calibrate satellites used to project and show accurate readings of snow pack. This is part of the X-SNOW project and we will be working with a NASA grant program!

In the spring of 2025, our Environmental class will go to the Envirothon, a state-wide academic competition. We are thrilled to be able to have such an experience this year.

The Johnsburg Central School District will vote on a Capital Improvement Project that thoughtfully addresses the needs and priorities of our school district. On January 16, 2025, District Voters will decide on a \$3 million Capital Improvement Project.





Renovating our science classrooms, which are nearly 60 years old. This will enhance the safety and functionality of the space.



As a designated Red Cross emergency location, it is vital that we have the capability to generate emergency power in the event of a local outage. The proposed project is based on the District's Building Conditions Survey, which is required by the New York State Education Department to be completed every 5 years. The two major parts of the project are to modernize our 1960 outdated and damaged Science classrooms/laboratories. In addition, we would install a generator to provide electric power when there's an outage. We are designated as a Red Cross Shelter, and without a generator, we may not be able to meet our community's needs during a crisis.

The Johnsburg Central School District is much more than an educational institution. We are committed to supporting the surrounding communities and strive for strong community partnerships. This project will enhance our school as well as our community. The Building Committee has worked with Tetra Tech Architects to design a plan that addresses some of our most pressing safety needs.

Why consider a Capital Improvement Project right now? Currently, the District is nearing the completion of our previous Capital Project payments. We are introducing a new project to maintain a more stable tax levy for our community.

Completing this work through a Capital Project also allows the District to take advantage of NYS Building Aid (covering nearly 58% of the project cost) and maintain a consistent source of revenue for future years.






